This Document was compiled and written by Warner Boyd, Mildred Larrington Rumrill and Hazel Larrington Moose.

The whole thrust of this delving into the history of Grace Episcopal Church, Madison, South Dakota had one main purpose, that being to establish just exactly when the first church service was held in the present building. We felt that the time must be coming when our church would be one hundred years old, as after all, other Churches in Madison were celebrating their one hundred years.

The Church records did not indicate when the Church was built. Reverend Cleveland noted that the Church was Consecrated (debt free) on August 7, 1893 in his record book dated from April 21, 1889.

We were chosen to write this part of history because our Grandparents were charter members of Grace Episcopal Church. The Pioneer families of Henry and John Boyd and William Larrington had arrived in Dakota Territory in horse drawn covered wagons to homestead land in 1879 and 1880. They were here to make a farm home for their families. Sarah Larrington was a sister of Henry and John Boyd.

These early day pioneers from England and Ireland came here as young people. The Boyd families were from the English speaking Province of Ireland and were members of the Episcopal Church. William Larrington was an immigrant from England and was a member of the Episcopal Church also. Many other pioneers who came to Dakota Territory were also Episcopalians, and they all must have had a very strong belief in God and their Christian faith. This gave them the courage and strength to endure the hardships of Pioneer Times, and they brought their form of Worship with them.

One source of information that proved to be very valuable in our research was the Mundt Foundation Library located on the campus of Dakota State College, here in Madison, South Dakota. The Librarian was most helpful in providing us with old newspapers. There were copies of the Old Madison Sentinel and The Madison Daily Leader. In the old newspapers of 1885, we found announcements of Episcopal Services to be held once a month by the Reverend John Moore of Mitchell, Dakota Territory.

The Episcopal Church announcements stated: "SERVICES WILL BE HELD IN THE OLD BAPTIST CHURCH." Sometimes, the services were held in Davidson Hall and also in Hanson Hall. As to where these buildings were in the past, we did not try and locate there former existence.

Services for the farm families were held in the Boyd Schoolhouse, built by John Boyd in 1882. This school was located one mile north of the John Boyd homestead. Warner Boyd has lived his entire life on this homestead. The buildings on his farm are across the road to the East from the Homestead Buildings. His is what is called "A Century Farm."

The Reverend Mr. Morris was assisted in these Services in the three locations by a Seminary Student from the Seabury Divinity School in Fairbault, Minnesota. His name was Dalrymple. The above accounts of early

Episcopal Services were published in "Pioneer Days" in Lake County by P.E. Tyrell, the Editor.

The first Confirmation Class for the Episcopal Faith was a class consisting of members of three families. They had all received their instructions from Reverend Morris at the Boyd School Mission and in conjunction with the services held in Madison. The members of this Confirmation Class: Christina, Etta and Susan Larrington of the William Larrington Family; Alice, William H. and James W. Boyd of the John Boyd Family and James E., Annie and Nelle Boyd of the Henry Boyd Family. The names of this class were given to St. Katherines Guild of Grace Episcopal Church by Mrs. J. E. Boyd (Susan Larrington).

The Guild published a cookbook in 1954 and included a short history of Grace Church. This Account had been previously written in the July 3, 1885 Sentinel Newspaper. Interest note: July 3, 1885 was on a Friday, as is July 3 of 1987.

Quote: "Special Episcopal Services will be held at 10:30 A.M. on July 20, 1885. These Services are to be held in the Court House. Bishop Hare, Reverend John Morris and L.R. Doud (another gentlemen prominently connected with the Episcopal Ministry) will present and hold Confirmation Services." The class members were not named in this account.

In an account of the first Confirmation Class of the Episcopal Church of Madison, Dakota Territory, the Lake County Gazetteer, compiled by George L. Houghton and published in October and November of 1892, states "A class of eleven were confirmed by Bishop Hare at the Court House in Madison. Members were of the Episcopal Faith."

From our memories of our Grandmother, Sarah Larrington, we recalled that she has told us that our Grandfather William Larrington and her two brothers Henry and John Boyd had hauled the rocks to build the foundation of the Episcopal Church. They used their horses and wagons, and the stones were gathered from their land. In visiting during the search for material to establish the date our church was built, Warner Boyd and Ervin (Grandson of Henry Boyd), and our sister Cecelia Larrington Humphrey also recalled hearing these stories.

We were especially gratified to read from an article written in the Madison Sentinel of July 3, 1885 the following: "Prospects are good for the erection of an Episcopal Church in the city of Madison, during the latter part of the year, or during the next season. Bishop Hare has partially agreed to furnish \$400.00 from the Building Funds of the Society and thinks he can give the help in the form of a loan to meet the necessary expenses. Three lots have been secured and stones for the foundation are already on the grounds." It is very evident that the early pioneers depended upon their Christian Faith and wanted to have Churches erected so their families would have a place of worship.

The Legal description of Grace Church: E 1/2 of SE 1/4 Block 7 of Kennedy's Extension. The official Address: 306 North West 3rd Street at Madison, South Dakota 57042. The deed was April 29, 1886, and was obtained by the Missionary Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church. The title is under

Chapter of Calvary Cathedral of Sioux Falls, South Dakota.

Following is information found in the Sentinel Newspaper, a twice weekly publication of the time:

August 15, 1890- (Friday)- Laying of the Corner Stone.

The formal laying of the corner stone of Grace Episcopal Church, the new Episcopal Church being erected in Madison, took place last evening at 7:00. The following Clergymen assisted Reverend Cleveland in the Services: Rev. John Babcock of Mitchell; Rev. Dr. James Trimble of Sioux Falls; Rev. H. Burt of Crow Creek Agency; Rev. Richards of Dell Rapids; Grand Master T.D. Kanouse of Sioux Falls, and Grand Chaplin/Junior Warden Henry Mead assisted the local Mason Lodge in the concluding Service by the Mason Fraternity.

November 21, 1890-(Friday)- The new Episcopal Church

will be lighted with incandescent electric lamps. Opening services in the new church will be at 11 A.M. on Thanksgiving Day November 27, 1890. The Reverend Dr. James Trimble, Rural Dean of the Eastern Deanery of South Dakota will be the preacher. All seats will be free and the public is generally invited to unite with the Congregation of Grace Church on this very special occasion.

W.J. Cleveland, Rector

A large group of people witnessed the first Ceremony, according to the Sentinel. Members of the Church and the Sunday School Children were lead by the Minister and they marched around the foundation of the church repeating the 132nd Psalm. A list of articles were read and then deposited in the vault. The corner stone was placed in position as the service continued with a prayer by Reverend Cleveland. The formal service was concluded according to the Masonic Ritual and the Reverend John Babcock delivered a brief but appropriate address. The singing of the hymn and the benediction by Rev. Cleveland closed the impressive service.

Services at the Church were as follows:

10:45 Morning Service

4:00 Sunday School & Catechism

The first baby baptized in Grace Church was on February 26, 1890 and was a daughter born to Oscar Otis and Emily Driselle Murray. She was named Gladys Marie. The First wedding in the new church was December 6, 1891 and the couple were Annie Boyd & LeRoy Seten.

An August 6, 1893 notice in the semi-weekly Sentinel (which by the way cost the sum of 50 cents per month and by carrier 15 cents per week):

"Episcopal Church Consecrated by Bishop Hare on August 4, 1893. For the past five years the Episcopal Society of this City has been lead by the Rev. W.J. Cleveland and his wife. Through their energy and earnest Christian work the church has grown materially in numbers. Three years ago the work of building a suitable house

for worship was undertaken and as a result the Society has today a beautiful structure built of Dell Rapids granite, furnished with solid oak pews and pulpit and interior neatly finished and decorated. The best part of all is it is free of debt."

Saturday night the building was formally consecrated a house of worship. S.C. Clark as Warden of Grace Church, read the instrument which testified that the house was free of debt. Reverend Cleveland read the instrument of donation and requested the Consecration by the Bishop. The consecration ceremonies lead by the bishop were unusually impressive.

Following this service Rev. John Babcock of Mitchell, Reverend Edward Ashley of Cheyenne River Agency, Reverend J.V. Hines of Elk Point, Rev. John Robinson of Sisseton Agency, Reverend F.Menz Weddell of Wells, Minnesota, Reverend J.W. McBride and Dr. Keeling arrived from Aberdeen yesterday in time to assist with the holy Communion Service.

The Episcopal Church is the eighth Church building for Madison.

The visiting Ministers were entertained with a picnic at Lake Madison on Wednesday afternoon by members of Grace Church.

A number of the visiting Episcopal clergymen left yesterday for Dell Rapids to assist in the consecration of the church there.

This description of the exterior of the new church was taken from the Lake County Gazetteer, published by George Haughton on page 73: "Lots for the New Church had been secured by Father Morris and on August 14, 1890 the Edifice for the new Grace Episcopal Church were laid by the members with religious ceremonies. The Church was built of Dell Rapids granite and decorated with field stones taken from the prairie. The Church plan is a Latin Cross. The seating capacity is for one hundred and thirty people with plans for expansion. It will be lighted with electricity.

Services are held by Reverend Cleveland on the first and third Sundays and on Friday evenings. Also from the Lake County Gazette on page 71 "The members of the Presbyterian Church are using Grace Church for ten months because their Church burned March 8, 1891. The New Church held the first service on Thanksgiving Day November 27, 1890."

Another item of worthy mention is the Sunday School. It was started by Reverend Cleveland and has always been in operation even though there were many years when there was not a Priest in attendance. There was a time in the 1920's that the Sunday School had four classes with four teachers. There were an average of about fifteen in each class. At one time in the 1940's and 1950's when the class consisted of seven little boys those being Robert & Burton Rumrill, Donald & David Bale, James & John Catselas and David Crane. One Little girl joined the class when her parents moved to Madison. She was Mary Zilch. This group of children were taught by Lola Shipton Boyd. Lola had a very active class and the children all loved her.

At Christmas time a nice program was put on by the children and a nice party afterward for them it was the highlight of the year to those eight little children.

To finish this portion about Grace Episcopal Church we think some mention should be made about what the interior of the church appears today. The same Altar and the same oak pews are there. The Altar has been moved to the East end of the church from the west end and of course the pews have been reversed to face the Altar. This was done in 1928 and 1929 with the addition of the Guild Hall. From time to time, stained glass windows were installed in memory of members of the church by their families. One particular window, located on the South side of the Altar, was given by children of the Rosebud Agency in memory of the two little boys of Rev. & Mrs. Cleveland. The boys were William C., fourteen months of age and George, one month in age. The remaining windows in the church, except the Guild Hall, are also stained glass.

Carpeting was installed covering the walk way from the front door and up to and to include the floor around the Altar. This was completed in the 1960's.

The padding on the kneeling benches was installed by the boys in the Sunday School during the 1940's and 1950's. The Priest at this time was Rev. McBeth and he also saw the installation of cupboards in the kitchen along with a new stove, refrigerator, floor covering and new dishes.

Part of the Guild Hall was carpeted in the 1970's, along with the hallways and the Sunday school rooms, located in the upper story. Also of interest, is the large viewing window located in the Elementary Sunday School Room overlooking the Sanctuary. This was installed during the tenure of Rev.

Gerald Richards.

This concludes what we were able to bring together of the early days of Grace Church. We hope that it will be something for future generations to enjoy as we have done our best to collect this information and record it for the future. We also hope that all who read this will enjoy and appreciate the path this church has traveled, and may assist in its future journey.

It has been our pleasure to do this and consider it our small contribution to the total history of Grace Episcopal Church.
